We also welcome book reviews, case comments and public lectures.

Selected articles would be published in hard copy and also prominently displayed on the institutional website as a resource for scholars and practitioners worldwide.

Papers must be based on original research, conform to the usual standard of academic publishing, be fully referenced and presented in the standard format employed by the series. Papers will be evaluated based on their contemporary relevance, contribution to their selected fields of research, structure and analytical vigour. Please refer to the submission guide below.

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- Articles should be between 5000 and 8000 words and should advance legal scholarship and knowledge in a specific area of sustainable development law and policy.
- (2) Articles should include an abstract of approximately 250 words that is not an extract from the article itself.
- (3) Details of the author should be supplied as the first footnote, attached by an asterisk to the author's name.

- (6) In terms of punctuation, where a quotation is made directly within the author's own sentences, only punctuation forming a part of it should fall within the quotation marks. For example, the author's text is "followed by a relevant quotation". All footnotes should follow the final punctuation mark of the sentence except where that mark is a colon or semi-colon.
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## Deadlines

We review articles on a rolling basis, for publication in any of our two editions published in a year. Authors should take note of the following deadlines:

*Spring Edition:* Only articles submitted on or before 12 noon on 31st March would be considered for publication in the spring edition.

*Fall Edition:* Only articles submitted on or before 12 noon on 31st August would be considered for publication in the Fall edition.

Deadlines are firm, articles submitted after the deadline may not be published. All papers should be submitted by email.

## EDITORIAL COMMENTS

It is with great pleasure that I present Volume 7 Issue 2 of Nigeria's *Journal of Sustainable Development Law and Policy.* In a time of great economic uncertainty and socio-political turbulence, the importance of maintaining pluralistic legal debate on sustainable development cannot be overemphasized. In Nigeria, for example, not only do the citizenry look to sustainability experts to offer the requisite theoretical and normative prescriptions that can lift the country out of its current economic recession, governments and policy leaders themselves look for proposals on how to cope with extant effects of fluctuating oil price, environmental contamination, climate change, energy insecurity and political skirmishes, especially in the troubled Niger Delta region.

In their joint paper, Melda Kamil Ariadno and Amelina Fitri deliver a detailed historical and analytical examination of how law can stimulate small-scale fishing in Indonesia. Idowu Ajibade expertly takes on the pertinent issue of addressing the problem of climate change in a just, equitable and rights-based manner. With heightened instability in the Niger Delta area of Nigeria, Olayinka Ajala's timely article offers robust insights on how international norms on resource governance can help promote security and sustainability in the Niger Delta region.

Seven articles then focus on the current state of sustainable development in Nigeria, specifically how institutions and laws can be reformed to achieve more coherence. Emmanuel Okon's insightful article examines normative and practical challenges to the full attainment of sustainable development in Nigeria, while Ekokoi Solomon illustrates these challenges with copious examples from the Nigeria's oil sector. Ifeolu Koni exhaustively unpacks the need for an organized and effective local government system in the quest for

sustainable development in Nigeria. Private law dimensions of sustainability are then examined in the ensuing articles. While Gbade Akinrinmade analyses the need for an expansive application of the fault theory in Nigeria, in order to better protect the rights of consumers to quality products, Abayomi Al-Ameen discusses the strategic importance of promoting Islamic banking and microfinance in Nigeria to achieve equity and sustainable development. The contributions are rounded off by Kolawole Mayomi's insightful analysis of the need for an expansive application and enforcement of demand guarantees in Nigeria's financial sector.

In effect, our authors have worked diligently to provide innovative perspectives on the myriad of issues surrounding energy transition, institutional efficiency and market regulation in Europe, United States, Indonesia and Nigeria. We invite you to think critically about their arguments, further your understanding of their claims, and challenge their underlying assumptions.
